# STATE GENERAL ELECTION November 8, 2022

The State General Election was held at the Ted Williams Camp, Loon Pond Lodge, 28 Precinct Street, on November 8, 2022 in accordance with the warrant issued by the Select Board and properly posted by a constable of the Town.

Specimen ballots, penalty and instruction cards were posted in accordance with the law. The ballot boxes were inspected, found to be empty, and registers were set at zero (0). All election officers were sworn to the faithful performance of their duties.

The polls were declared open at 7:00 AM and closed at 8:00 PM in accordance with the Warrant. There were <u>5550 BALLOTS CAST</u>, which includes <u>28</u> Absentee ballots, <u>2205</u> Early Voting ballots, <u>2</u> UOCAVA, and <u>3</u> Provisional's. <u>Precinct One</u> had <u>1819</u> ballots, <u>Precinct Two</u> had <u>1947</u> ballots and <u>Precinct Three</u> had <u>1784</u> ballots.

Preliminary totals were announced around 8:20pm in the foyer, then all ballots were checked for write-ins and there were three (3) ballots that had to be hand counted.

It was around <u>**12:35 AM</u>** when I made the final call to Associated Press. The Final Results are as follows:</u>

# CENTRAL TABULATION FACILITY

Central Tabulation Facility (CTF) was designated at the Ted Williams Camp to process all of the Early & Absentee Voting Ballots. The ballot boxes were inspected, found to be empty, and registers were set at zero. All election officers were sworn to the faithful performance of their duties. Each precinct was tabulated separately and the CTF results were combine with the Precinct Totals above.

There were <u>2205 BALLOTS CAST</u>, which includes <u>28</u> Absentees and <u>20</u> hand counts. <u>Precinct One</u> had <u>677</u> ballots, <u>Precinct Two</u> had <u>789</u> ballots and <u>Precinct Three</u> had <u>739</u> ballots.

#### EARLY VOTING SESSIONS

Early Voting took place at the Old Town Hall, 2 Precinct Street as follows: from Saturdays October 22nd and October 29th from 8:00am – 2:00pm; Sundays, No EV hours; Monday -Thursday, October 24th – November 3rd from 8:00am-4:30pm and Fridays, October 28th and November 4th from 8:00am- 12pm Noon.

**NOTE:** On June 22, 2022, an election reform law titled "The VOTES Act" was signed into law. Among other things, the VOTES act makes several of the temporary changes from the pandemic permanent, so many of the policies and procedures are familiar from administering elections in 2020. The new law also makes the absentee voting process and early voting by mail processes consistent.

in addition to in-person voting options which will still be available for all elections, both at early voting locations and at polling places on Election Day. Voters were encouraged to determine the most safe and convenient way for them to participate in the upcoming elections.


In the current environment, the Elections Division wanted to ensure that all elections officials are prepared to protect the health and safety of poll workers and voters during in-person voting, both during the early voting period and on Election Day.

## POST ELECTION TABULATION BALLOTS

On Friday, **November 12, 2022 at 1:00 PM**, election officers were sworn to the faithful performance of their duties and met at the Old Town Hall, 2 Precinct Street to open <u>15</u> Early Vote by Mail Ballots postmarked by November 8, 2022; **Precinct 1** had <u>5</u> ballots, **Precinct 2** had <u>4</u> ballot and **Precinct 3** had <u>6</u> ballots and these figures are reflected in the totals above.

#### FEDERAL WRITE-INS/OVERSEAS BALLOTS

The Board of Registrars did not meet at the Town Clerk's Office to open the Federal Write-In Ballots or Mail-In Overseas Ballots on November 18, 2022 at 5:01pm; due to the fact no Federal Write-in Ballots or Mail-In Overseas Ballots were received by 5:00pm.



# NOTE: New Procedure to Check-In at the State General Election and Early Voting Session

To accelerate the check-in process at State's General Election this year, check-in was accomplished by the use of electronic Poll Pads. The use of these tablets allowed our election officers to check in a voter:

1. By manually entering the first three (3) letters of the voter's first and last name; or

2. By scanning the bar code on the back of the voter's driver's license. In this case, the Poll Pad matches the name and birth date of the person on the voter list with the name and birth date it reads from the bar code on the back of the license. <u>No information from the</u> <u>scanned license is retained by the Poll Pad</u>. The Commonwealth of Massachusetts does not require that a voter present a license to check in at any Elections and Town Meetings.

The Poll Pads immediately talk to one another, eliminating any chance of a voter checking in more than once.
